Always ask this seal, which ensures the tenderness, the marbling and the terroir from pasture to table! Enjoy your reading and see you next issue.

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
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
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# Devon conquers Central Brazil

nce a month, doctor Alexandre Ferrari leaves his home in São Paulo's ABC Region and flies to Mato Grosso do Sul State. From the Campo Grande airport, it takes more than two hours' drive to Santa Helena Pecuária, a company that operates farms from Alcinópolis and Figueirão cities – there, one of the main Devon herds in the Central Brazil is found.

Nearly 50 thousand acres are dedicated to cattle raising. "We've been in the region for 30 years. In the beginning, we bought calves and sold fed cattle. In 2003, we bought the Fazenda Planalto farm and decided to do everything, from growing to fattening, avoiding seasonality effects," the rancher says.

The first contact with the breed was when Ferrari bought the Planalto farm with 'closed gates' – he received also 850 Nelore cows and

50 Devon bulls. "The previous owner run farms belonging to Ratinho (a famous TV host), who raised Devon, among others. It began this way, little by little," he recalls.

Since then, the passion for the breed has only grown. Ferrari expanded the lands, investing on cows, always focused on crosses between the Devon bull and Nelore females. Today, 80% are through natural mating and 20% through artificial insemination.

The doctor says Devon is the only British breed that can be used in a breeding program in the Central-West. "With other breeds, you'll need animals with 7/8 inheritance for the cross." He highlights that reproductive precocity is important. Feeding is done on pasture, and the animal has a certain destination: the slaughterhouse.

This year, heifers slaughtered at 24

months of age weighed 17.9 arrobas (591 pounds). Males were slaughtered between 28 and 30 months of age. This is to achieve 3 mm of homogeneous subcutaneous fat thickness, which is the standard for quality meat.

Today, there are 4,400 cows exposed to nearly 270 bulls PO. "Most of the bulls belong to Benedito Franco, who invested in genetic improvement to adapt the animals to the Central-West conditions. The bull has a shorter naval anatomy, among other traits," the raiser says.

Among Ferrari's customers is JBS, the world's biggest meat producer. The company introduced the appealingly gourmet 1953 brand, which has thrived in the premium beef market. Launched one year and half ago, the label refers to the company's foundation date. "They impose considerable requirements for grading this product. We're the only supplier of 1953 meat from in--field system; the remaining is beef produced from cattle fed in confinement to achieve the desired precocity and subcutaneous fat layer," Ferrari adds





# **DEVON** Aenthusiast

Opened this year in Bombinhas, in Santa Catarina coastal area, the Casa de Carnes Edson (Edson Meat House) has turned into a mandatory stop for those seeking Devon cuts.

ntrepreneur Edson Braun houses a butcher shop in the facility and promotes lively happy hours, with live music and Devon beef skewers.

Braun got to know the certified meat on its launch, in 2017, while still working in a grocery shop in Bombinhas. "I was the first to receive a carcass and produce Devon cuts. Many customers were amazed by the meat. Since then, I only have worked with Devon.

The place has become a meeting point in Bombinhas. From 9:00am to 2:pm, Braun runs the butcher shop and sells roasted beef. From the evening on, double beer, live music and Devon beef skewers come into play. "I sell on average 100 skewers per night. And summer hasn't come yet," he adds.

Last summer, when he still worked at the grocery shop and had already presented his customers the Devon beef, the orders from burger houses and restaurants increased. "They discovered the advantages of Devon, including the meat's exceptional taste and tenderness. This perception pleased the region's clientele," he explains.

Only a restaurant in the city purchases on average 200 pounds of minced meat per week for its burger production – in low season. During summer, when tourists crowd the Santa Catarina's beautiful coast and the demand rises, the restaurant orders nearly 331 pounds of ground beef per day. "Not taking on account the customers from other cities who show up here, like Curitiba, Balneário Camboriú and Joinville," Braun says.

The customer base is varied. Braun has invested in great food with live entertainment, which has helped to keep the restaurant full from Tuesday

to Saturday, when it opens at night. In the butcher shop, during the day, the demand is for diverse Devon cuts. We have also prime beef cuts, including T-bone, short rib, prime rib and shoulder," Braun reveals.

By the way, he adds, when it

comes to Devon beef, the choice meat can be considered as prime beef. "Everybody thinks a cut like shoulder clod or brisket must be cooked slow in a pan. In the case of Devon, I taught my customers that it is as tender as other more noble cuts. Today there are customers that only order clod."

Along with the Brazilian Association of Devon Breeders (AB-CD), Braun has attended monthly workshops in the region, bringing his Devon expertise to an eager-to-learn audience. "Those who didn't know the breed were amazed," he says, referring to one of the last events.

# **Trips between Nova** Prata and the countryside of Bahia

**Two sisters** living in Rio Grande do Sul's countryside run a farm in the Brazilian Northeast. In Lages (SC), an ophthalmologist found that, besides taking care of patients, managing his family's lands is a promising business. Both examples show the importance of succession for cattle raising.




laudia and Paula Antoniolli lead the Prata Nova farm in Correntina, Bahia. Daughters of Almor Antoniolli, a pioneer in introducing Devon in the Brazilian Northeast, they run the business from Nova Prata, in the Serra Gaúcha region.

"We have a cousin who is an agronomist and lives there, managing the crop production and the cattle with the help of a technician. We go to the farm every two months and stay in contact through the Internet," Claudia says. The Devons' adaptation to the farm has been improved day by day. As an European breed, more adaptable to cold weather, they need much shade and are vulnerable to tick infestations.

Almor and his daughters make decisions together on the business. "As well as our father, we don't believe in farming with no crop-livestock integration. We have breeding stocks of Devon PO and Nelore PO animals and make crosses between the two breeds," Claudia says.

Everything began in 1998, when Almor took to Bahia his two first Devons, purchased from the Santa Tereza and Santa Lúcia farms. His daughters were gradually involved in

the business. Claudia got a degree in veterinary medicine in 2000 and spent a year at the farm, returning to Porto Alegre to pursue a master's degree at UFRGS. Paula stayed for a longer time and now the sisters occasionally visit the farm in Bahia, where they also grow soy and corn.

## A doctor in the fields

doctor based in Lages (SC), José Luiz Branco Ramos often switches the white coat for the faming activities. His father, Dr. Airton Rogério Ribeiro Ramos, was a Devon pioneer in the highlands of Santa Catarina with the Santa Rita farm.

Carmen, Airton's wife, recalls that in 1972 her husband purchased four Devons from a farm in Lagoa Vermelha (RS). José Luiz and his three brothers grew up in this rural environment.

From 16 to 32 years of age, José Luiz dedicated himself to studies, getting a degree in medicine and pursuing specialization courses. He came back to Lages, where he works as an ophthalmologist. After his father's death, three years ago, he decided to run the farm with his mother. "I always had an interest, but I

hadn't time. Now I'm trying to move forward," he says.

Today, Devon accounts for almost the entire herd – nearly 400 animals. "Thanks to its hardiness, the breed adapts well to the Santa Catarina's highlands, benefited by the region's climate," the doctor adds.

José Luiz's goal is to improve and increase the breeding stock. His two children (6 and 2 years of age) are enjoying the countryside, a sign that they are willing to carry on their family's tradition.

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# Devon wins space in Expolage

onsidered one of the biggest agribusiness trade shows in Santa Catarina State, Expolages is also a stage to show the quality of beef cattle to a large audience. In 2018, the event was held between October 9 and 14 and drew a crowd to the Conta Dinheiro Exhibition Park in Lages city.

Gilson Hoffmann, the vice-president of ABCD, served as a judge during Expolages and was impressed with the high level of the animals in the exhibition's last edition. "I see that year after year, and this growth is not only in terms of quantity, but also quality.

Devon took 18 animals to Expolages last year. According to Hoffman, today it is one of the British most valuable breeds in Santa Catarina. "We can see a high level of motivation on the part of raisers and also an increased demand for sires. In trade fairs, we realized that the breed's calves and heifers get the highest prices," Hoffmann says.

Cacio Moraes, president of the Devon Breed Raisers' regional section in Santa Catarina, says the exhibitor's participation in Expolages has been increasing. "What also impressed us was the greater demand for Devon from beef cattle raisers eager to learn about the breed's traits." According to him, the Devon's demonstrated potential to gather people who produce, admire and consume the breed's meat marked the trade show.

Among the prize-winning animals, the bull Dimitre, from São Luiz (box 120), owned by exhibitor Ivo Tadeu Bianchini, from the São Luiz Farm, Capão Alto (SC), was the grand champion. The cow named Festeira da Gralha Azul (box 126),

shown by Antônio Marcos Passarin, from the Gralha Azul Farm, Fraiburgo (SC), won the title of Grand Champion Female. Passarin also sold a **Devon Junior Champion**  bull for a record of BRL 19,200.

According to Moraes, the Devon certified calves and heifers are an additional part of the breed's certified beef program. But only the certification status of the calf is not a guarantee that a bonus will be paid by the meat-packing plants, as it depends on the degree of finish against age and weight. "Today we seek an average Devon, with short hair and beef aptitude, the most important traits for modern cattle raising," he explains.

Devon is known for its docile dams, with excellent mothering ability and rustic traits, producing progenies for confinement, semi-confinement and pasture finishing systems with a great performance, the president of the Santa Catarina's Devon Breed Raisers Section says. These are advantages already recognized by the market, as well as the level of marbling and meat tenderness.

For the next edition of Expolages, Moraes expects a greater number of exhibitors, mostly for rustic animals - last year, he won the event with a rustic cow from the Colina Farm, São José do Cerrito (SC). Among the males, the champion prize was awarded to the Santa Helena Maria Farm, owned by Helena Cristina Bianchini Araújo, from Lages (SC).

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# Expoingá: more visibility for Devon

ne of the greatest Brazilian agribusiness trade shows, Expoingá 2019 marked Maringá (PR) last May. Gilson Hoffmann, the vice-president of ABCD, says 100 Devon animals were taken to the event, all of them from Rio Grande do Sul State. Nearly 100 people attended the conference on Devon, the crossbreeding perspectives in the Central Brazil and tropical regions and the certified Devon beef. "It exceeded our expectations. There were many people interested


in buying semen and Devon sires, with good business prospects," he says.

According to Alfredo Tavares, a Devon raiser from Pedras Altas (RS) who served as a judge in the event, despite their small number, the Devons stood out for their quality. "The most important for the breed was the visibility we had. The judging was conducted together with Nelore animals, the most common zebuine breed there. After that, we had a good audience watching our

To conclude, it couldn't lack the traditional churrasco made with certified Devon meat. "The people were delighted at the delicious, tender meat. Devon has received unanimous approval among those who tried it," he says.


Maria Iraclézia de Araújo, president of the Rural Society of Maringá, highlights this was the Devon's first participation in the fair, which received 550,000 visitors over ten days. "We got to know



the Devon breed during Expointer, in Esteio, and contacted the association, the breeders, to make them come to Maringá," she says.

Expoingá 2019 was held from May 9 to 19 in Maringá (PR). It gathered 1,300

exhibitors and showcased more that 7,000 small and big animals, new equine and bovine breeds, an Agri-technological Space and startups, in addition to 28 performances by Brazilian artists.

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# evon: a booming market for calves

ast fall, the calf production saw booming markets. The good soybean productivity rates helped by a rainy winter and the higher prices of the grain - driven by the appreciation of the U.S. dollar and the international markets - increased the amount of money circulating in those markets. According to veterinarian Lucas Teixeira Hax, who is also the technical director of ABCD, the end of harvest and the conversion of lands into pastures helped beef cattle finishers in the search for superior calves.

On the retail side, the share of the population who buys premium meat - that is, people willing to pay a little more for a beef cut to have a high--quality consumption experience – is increasing. Thus, meat certification programs like the Certified Devon Beef are expanding, providing these customers quality assurance and transparency.

According to Lucas Hax, the value added to certified carcasses is also transferred to cattle raisers through bonus payment for animals that meet the breed and carcass standards required by these programs. In 2018, the average bonus for certified Devon animals slaughtered was more than R\$1 per kilogram (2.2 pounds) of carcass. Following this path, the Association created the Certified Devon Calf Program, aimed at leading Devon animals to certified slaughter facilities and getting better payments for raisers of calves that qualify for certification based on the racial pattern.

The Certified Devon Calf Program started at the beginning of this year. Although young, its value-adding effects are already clear. In the town of Caçador, Santa Catarina State, one of the first certification areas for Devon calves, a trade show held in April exceeded expectations. The certified Devon castrated male calves were sold at an average R\$0.15 increase per kilogram against the others animals. The certified Devon cows had an average increase of R\$2.51 per kg, more than 38% higher than the average price paid for other females.


These data are an important response from the market for Devon. While consumers approve the quality of meat, producers confirm the breed's excellent zootechnical performance. Thus, both breeders and re-breeders, as well as finishers and confined cow-calf producers, add value to their products, increasing their business' sustainability and working on the "top shelf" of cattle farming!



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# Quality of animals stands out in Expointer

total of 48 animals eligible for a prize and other 30 rustic ones registered for Expointer 2018, including 20 males and 10 females. The Camboatã farm was the highlight of the contest, winning the grand champion female and the reserve grand champion bull and cow awards. The Tupi farm,

owned by Paludo Agropecuária, also excelled in the judging ring, receiving is first award in the contest. The winner was Dynamite da Tupi 111.

Camboatã also stood out in the competition by categories and won five prizes. The farm also got the Junior Exhibitor Trophy with

Tatuagem TE 601, presented by Lucas Pandolfi.

According to the farm's owner, Marcos Pandolfi, this was the best result in the Expointer's history. "Camboatã Agropecuária has been investing in the Devon breed for more than 15 years, with selection, imports of bovine semen and embryo transfer. The

breeders have done in the genetics field. "Some lots were very similar, which turned the judging into a difficult task. The bar was really high," he said.

Reinoldes Cherubini also stresses the greater number of rustic breeds. "The animals have improved and excelled in the events over the past few years. I'm glad that the breeders are investing in rustic animals."

The rustic animals entered the

ring for the Top Devon auction on August 30, at Ring J in the Assis Brasil Exhibition Park, in Esteio. The average for bulls was R\$7,840.00. The eight animals sold reached R\$62,720.00.

The highest-price bull was grand champion Carrasco S Stone 3950, from the Santa Alice Farm, purchased by Renan Fogaça, from the town of Cambará do Sul.

result is a top genetics that has proved its quality in the judging rings," Pandolfi says.

According to Gilson Hoffman, the technician in charge at Agropecuária Paludo, the bull Dynamite showed its male head, a good bone structure and a perfect posterior, as well as a good rib-eye area, with 141 cm<sup>2</sup>, among other traits.

Reinoldes Cherubini, the contest's judge, evaluated the animals that entered the ring as high-quality and excellent pattern animals. According to Cherubini, the high level of the animals in 2018 Expointer demonstrated the good work that

# Certified meat in search of new markets

mplemented in May 2017, the Certified Devon Beef Program completed two successful years with prospects of expansion. Since then, 3,000 animals with the Certification Seal were slaughtered, among castrated steers and heifers, totalling 761,800 kg (nearly 1.7 million pounds) from May 2017 to May 2019.

The seal on packages ensures to the consumers the traceability and authenticity of the product, approved based on strict quality criteria including, for instance, animals with a guarantee of origin and raised according to animal welfare standards.

Today, 150 breeders are registered as suppliers for the production of Certified Devon beef cuts. All the slaughter procedures are carried out at the Frigorífico São João meat-packing plant, in Santa Catarina State, a which is benchmark of high-quality meat. The noble cuts are found in 130 points of sale, including the famous Casa


de Carnes Edson, in the city of Bombinhas, a mandatory stop for those seeking Devon cuts.

For the time being, the certified Devon meat is still an exclusivity of Santa Catarina's consumers. Simone Bianchini, the president of the Brazilian Association of Devon Breeders, says the next step is widening the market, integrating the Rio Grande do Sul's chain to the system. "The state is a promising market for slaughter and consumption of Certified Devon Beef, so there are ongoing negotiations with two meat-packing companies from there," she says.

The Bovine Breeds Certification Program is endorsed by the Brazilian Agriculture and Livestock Confederation (CNA), which aims at promoting and valuing the bovine breed, ensuring a bonus payment to the producers for the arroba price and adding value to the meat. Currently, eight breeds are included in the program.

According to Simone, this initiative boosts the growing premium meat market. "It raises the bar and gives transparency. The consumer now knows that a cut showing the seal has a guarantee behind it. And it's the Association – through a specialized technician – that ensures this quality pattern," she adds.

# **Carcass contest**

his October, the Brazilian Association of Devon Breeders (ABCD) plans to promote a carcass contest. The event will be held in partnership with Frigorifico São João (SC), currently the only meat-packing company offering certified Devon beef.

According to the ABCD's president, Simone Bianchini, the contest will include two categories. One will focus only on grass-fed cattle (pasture-raised and finished animals, with no grain supplementation) to present a new product line to the market. The other will have confinement-raised cattle. "The idea is to work on the advantages of each

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one and see whether there is any difference in terms of meat taste," Simone explains.


Lucas Teixeira Hax, from ABCD, says the patterns taken on account are the same as those considered for slaughtering under the certification program, like castrated males and females with up to four teeth. The animals are divided into four groups: distinct males, distinct females, crossbred Devon bull and crossbred Devon cows.

"These carcasses are scored based on a few criteria, including sanity, breed pattern, age, carcass conformation and weight, and fatness degree," Hax says. The contest will



be organized by a technician from the Devon Certification program, a member of the ABCD's technical board and a representative of Frigorífico São João.

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# Foot-and-mouth disease: withdrawal of vaccination on the horizon

By 2023, the Ministry of Agriculture expects to end the vaccination program to combat foot-and-mouth disease. The plan includes the gradual withdrawal of vaccination in the country until it is finally recognized as a disease-free zone without vaccination

nly the state of Santa Catarina has this status so far. Soon it will be followed by Paraná – the Ministry has approved the suspension of the vaccine by the end of 2019. The neighboring Rio Grande do Sul wants to follow the same path.

The Rio Grande do Sul's Department of Agriculture, Livestock and Rural Development has already drawn up a strategic plan to achieve those goals. It has allowed the state to reach the targets, and most of them were already met or are underway.

According to the document, progress has been made in the surveillance and monitoring system across the state, including the control of animal and product transit at border checkpoints.

For the government, the decision to suspend the vaccine is not a unilateral move. "We discussed with farmers' unions and associations so that we could require the status of FMD-free zone without vaccination," explains the director of the Agriculture and Livestock Defense Division (DDA) of the Rio Grande do Sul's Rural Development Department, Antonio Carlos Ferreira Neto.

One of the reasons, he says, is to follow up the status of Paraná, where herds were vaccinated for the last time in May 2019 and the withdrawal process has already begun. If Rio Grande do Sul keeps the vaccination, it would loose its current market share, and not only for cattle.

He adds that, over the last two years, the state government adopted a number of measures to ensure the

herds' sanitary security, always to meet the Ministry of Agriculture's requirements. After an audit carried out in last July, the Ministry's decision will be announced by September. "From this assessment on, which hopefully will be positive, we'll start the vaccination withdrawal process," he savs.

Animal health experts say the measure should be treated with caution. While the vaccine withdrawal has the potential to open new markets for the Brazilian beef, in case of new outbreaks of the disease, the results would be disastrous, with damages to Brasil's exports.

The director of the Veterinary Professionals' Union of Rio Grande do Sul (Simvet-RS), João Júnior, says the inspection services are still unsatisfactory, as there aren't enough

technicians to meet the total demand. "We also need to improve the control along state and national highways so that we can have an appropriate movement of animals with Animal Transit Guides (GTAs)," he explains.

According to the Ministry of Agriculture, the GTA is the official document required for transporting animals in Brazil and contains crucial traceability information (origin, destination, purpose, species, vaccination, among others). Today, in most of the states, the GTAs are issued electronically, which makes the process easier and allows the raiser to travel with the animal's appropriate documents.

Júnior agrees that the Rio Grande do Sul's Agriculture Department and the Ministry of Agriculture have proved that no FMD circulating virus was detected in the state. This gives security to the production chain in the short term. But it takes to go beyond. Brazil's shared border with Uruguay and Argentina is huge and a large portion of it is a free-access area. Surveillance systems for animal health are lacking.

He mentions the economic factor. Rio Grande do Sul sells many Devon, Angus and Hereford bulls to São Paulo and Paraná. If the vaccination is kept in the state and suspended in Paraná, the transportation of these animals to the Southeast will be hampered. "Today there is a sanitary corridor in Santa Catarina. We'll need another one in Paraná, and this will increase the costs. We'll lose market share," he says.

Raiser Gilson Hoffman, a member of the Brazilian Association of Devon Breeder's board of directors, says suspending the vaccine program will be beneficial, but it should be treated with caution. "Rio Grande do Sul conducted a range of epidemiological studies over the past years confirming the absence of the virus. We're in a positive phase, but we need to improve the surveillance on the borders," he advises. Between 2015 and 2018, he adds, the state sold more than 7,000 sires to Paraná. "That's why we must go hand in hand with Paraná in this process."

Former state secretary of Agriculture and representative Ernani Polo explains "Rio Grande do Sul is

a top exporter of animal protein." According to him, who leads the State Legislator's Front for Supporting the Animal Status Change, the measures developed with the Ministry of Agriculture allow to improve the health status, granting Rio Grande do Sul the same FMD--free zone without vaccination status as Santa Catarina.

The state has also kept since 2005 the Animal Development and Health Defense Fund (Fundesa), aimed at proposing and supporting the development of animal health actions, as well as ensuring a quick response during the intervention in sanitary matters and further indemnification for farmers.

What all the experts agree on is that the disease-free zone without vaccination status, when applied

to Brazil, will improve the Brazilian beef's image abroad. It is expected to have a positive impact on all animal and protein chains, mostly in poultry and pork meat industry, which are very important in the country's southern region.



# Symposium on Devon A Beef at 'Churrasco' Party

othing more appropriate than taking the Devon beef to the National Capital of Churrasco (the Brazilian-style barbecue). This is what happened on January 30 this year, at the Devon Meat Symposium during the traditional Churrasco Party in Lagoa Vermelha city.

Agronomist Ilvandro Barreto explains the event aims to stress the importance of the churrasco party, for what the dish means for culture and history. "The churrasco is a Rio Grande do Sul's traditional dish, but it has a distinctive feature because of Lagoa Vermelha's historical background and factors like tropeirismo (the activity of cattle driving across the southern and southeastern regions in 18th and 19th centuries)," he savs.

Mello adds that the herds entered the region around 1700 with the tropeiros (troops on horseback who transported cattle and goods). In 1912 the first Devons started to arrive at Lagoa Vermelha when the city was still a district of André da Rocha. "Since then, the region has been investing on genetic breeding," he says. Today, Lagoa Vermelha is a traditional hub for the Devon breed.

According to Barreto, the symposium attendees usually come back the following year. New participants





are attracted by the conferences on the premium meat market, the quality of Devon meat and the integration of crop and cattle farming that ensures good pasture for the animals and native grasslands for finishing cattle during the summer.

One of the event's highlights was agronomist and Lagoa Vermelha mayor Gustavo Bonotto. He stressed the importance of doing an excellent work with Devon. The discussions also addressed the need to develop workers like butcherers and roasters, who strive to keep the churrasco tradition alive in Lagoa Vermelha.

The Lagoa Vermelha's churrasco has a unique recipe. Everything begins with the cattle raising model, which results in a better-quality beef and premium cuts. Only the rib is roasted with bone-in, and the skewers used are made of wood.

The Devon Symposium traditionally opens the National Churrasco Party

"The cutting style is also different, following the line of the rib bone. In the meat shops, cross-sectional cutting is the usual method," Mello says.

So much history and taste may gain official recognition. A bill (PL193/2018) presented by former-senator Ana

Amélia Lemos to grant Lagoa Vermelha the title of National Capital of Churrasco is waiting approval by Brazil's Chamber of Deputies. It was passed by the Senate's Education Committee and needs a final vote from the lower house for it to become law.

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

# **D-Day in Expointer**

The big moment of the Devon breed in the Expointer 2019 will be on August 28. That's when the judging contests, prizes and business-related activities will happen during the exhibition held in Esteio.



t's no wonder that the date has been called the D-Day, as it rescues a history still vivid in people's memory. "The D-Day took place in Bagé from 1972 to 1991 and it was a memorable period for the breed," explains the president of ABCD, Simone Bianchini.

The idea started with Batalha Farm, owned by José Gomes Fi-Iho. After his death, the property was divided into four cattle farms (Marival, Rodeio Colorado, Bata-Iha and Vigia).



A former president of ABCD and member of its Advisory Board, Morecy Costa Medeiros attended all the D-Day editions. In the beginning, each farm took 40 bulls for the event, which always happened on the October 12 holiday. The auctions were conducted by the family group responsible for organizing the event.

After the first years, in an attempt to attract more people, the D-Day started to be held at the Farmers Association of Bagé. "People came from all over the state, sometimes gathering as many as 250," recalls Morecy, a pioneer from the Rodeio Colorado farm.

First, the best bulls were traded, sparking fierce competition among the raisers. Then lots including up to 12 animals each were sold, "There were judges from other towns, like Cirne Lima and Ivo Bianchini, and a big churrasco prepared with Devon meat," says Morecy, an 81-year-old now living in Capão da Canoa, in Rio Grande do Sul's coastline.


This year, the activities start at 8:30AM, at Ring J, with the judging of rustic animals. At 10:30AM and 2:00PM, respectively, the cows and bulls eligible for prizes will be



evaluated. The awards will be handed out from 6:30PM, at the Devon booth, and the champions' parade takes place at the Expointer Boulevard.

"We'll have a big attraction for the D-Day evening at the booth's boulevard, where you'll find a business desk and a good place to chat with friends and customers while enjoying a certified Devon meat. We'll also present the excellent Devon products of the virtual Top Devon auction," Simone says.

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# rom Devon's rusticity to precocity

Breeder Joemir Gassen Gonçalves, who is the third generation of his family to deal with Devon cattle, lives in a farm in Rio Pardo countryside, where he raises nearly 600 animals.

t least two times per day, he drives 27 kilometers between the town and the São Luiz farm to take and pick his 14-year-old daughter from school.

Habituated to the farming activities, she is the fourth generation and the future of the Devon breed in the family. Gonçalves says she knows the Devon's aptitudes usually seen in printed prospects by heart. "At some moment of our journey, all of them were crucial," he adds.

Everything started with his grandfather, Leovegildo Gonçalves, who around 1927 purchased the land where the farm is currently located. "My grandfather saw those red, strong animals and didn't know much about the breed. But he realized that it could withstand the cold weather and humidity while pulling the plow on the rice field," Gonçalves says.

Without a tractor, the cattle were the only alternative for the heavy work on the farm. The cattle's rusticity became a determining factor in the family's daily routine, Gonçalves recollects, through the use of yokes of oxen. His grandfather owned as many as 160 yokes, each one harnessing two oxen together.

Joemir's father, Palmir Gonçalves, continued the work with the animals on the rice field, but he saw the gains from the Devon's fertility and productivity. The cows calved early and produced more than one calf per year. "My father and my mother, who was a German, realized that the Devon cows had a strong mothering ability. My mother tamed the calves, which became extremely docile and easy to sell," Joemir says.

Now, with Joemir, the third generation relays on the Devon's precocity to get better results in beef production. A heifer becomes pregnant

before two years of age, and a male reaches 380 kg (830 pounds) within one year and a half. "This only with pasture feeding, we don't use troughs," the farmer explains. He supplies meat to Frigorífico Gassen, a meat-packing plant from Santa Cruz do Sul.

With a degree in zootechnics, Gonçalves says his daughter plans to do a degree in agriculture-related sciences to continue the family's business. "My grandfather knew the rusticity traits of the Devons. My father knew the fertility, and I knew the breed's precocity traits. It's a huge story for those who have lived in the field for almost 100 years," he adds.



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
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
